Sermonette for June 29th, 2014

Youth Sunday

As you may remember last week I mentioned that we had **13** children <u>graduate</u> from our preschool pre-kindergarten class on the 20th of this month. As I have told you before <u>Youth Sunday</u> is one of my **favorite** Sundays. It is a time when our <u>youth get to shine</u>. It is a time of **enthusiasm** and **opportunity** for them to come before our congregation. During this last week I sent out <u>emails</u> to some of the **parents** of our youth as well as to some of **them** to find out what they are up to **not only** this summer but what they are looking **forward to** in the future. You **may** remember that a couple of weeks ago here in church our quilters gave away **6** quilts to our <u>graduating seniors</u> who now are anticipating the **journey** ahead.

Without using names, I wanted to let you know what <u>some</u> of these youth have in mind. Beginning with the <u>graduates</u> from preschool they wanted to be everything from a **dinosaur**, to a **teacher**, to a **tightrope** walker, to a **fancy man**—which he <u>already was</u> given the fact that he had **turquoise** spiky hair at graduation.

In our congregation we have a <u>wide age group</u>. This summer some of the **younger** children are going to be <u>reading</u>, <u>drawing</u>, <u>dancing</u>, <u>going</u> to the beach and <u>swimming</u>, and spending summer nights at the <u>drive-in</u> with family. Our **middle school age** group are keeping active by <u>playing instruments</u>, we have an <u>avid reader</u> who would like to be **physicist**, there is a love of playing <u>video games</u> and hopefully **designing them** when they get older—or maybe being an <u>architect</u>—they're not quite sure yet, and there are those who love <u>theater and singing</u> as well as those who have a keen <u>sense of right and wrong</u> who would like to be a <u>lawyer</u> when they are grown.

Our **high school** youth are very active in sports—<u>football</u>, soccer, and water <u>polo</u> are on the list. They love going to the <u>beach</u>, they <u>play instruments</u> in the school band, participate in <u>school plays</u>, they are <u>active in and hold the office</u> of President of Future Farmers of America, they <u>show livestock</u> at various fairs, one is taking <u>college classes</u> along with the regular high school curriculum, one is going to <u>summer school</u> to get ahead as this student would like to work in the field

of **engineering or science**, some are taking <u>piano lessons</u>, one is the <u>manager of</u> the Comedy Sports Team at school, and we cannot forget taking <u>family trips</u>.

The **graduated students** are helping out at <u>food pantries</u>, trying to be a good <u>role model</u> for younger kids as a lifelong dream is to <u>help people</u> who are less fortunate.
