## Sermon for September 1, 2013

## Fifteenth Sunday of Pentecost, Luke 14:1, 7-14

BLESSINGS TO YOU AND PEACE FROM GOD THE FATHER, OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST, AND THE HOLY SPIRIT. AMEN.

This morning I would like to begin my sermon with a reading from C.S.

Lewis' *Mere Christianity*. Mr. Lewis writes, (quote) "Of course we never wanted, and never asked, to be made into the sort of creatures He (God) is going to make us into. But the question is <u>not</u> what we intended ourselves to be, but what He intended us to be when He made us. He is the inventor, we are only the machine.

He is the painter, we are only the picture. How should we know what He means for us to be like? We may be content to remain what we call 'ordinary people'; but He is determined to carry out a quite different plan. To shrink back from the plan is not humility; it is *laziness and cowardice*. To submit to His plan is not conceit: it is *obedience*." (end quote)

In **all** three of our readings for this morning there is a *common thread* which runs through each of them: in **Proverbs** and in the **gospel** lesson from Luke one is **called upon** to be humble and to **live** life with humility—do **not** place oneself forward or higher than you ought as it may result in to being put in a **lower** place which will lead to <u>disgrace</u>, but one is to **sit** at the lower position so one might be **honored** when one is asked to **sit up higher** in the presence of all. In the reading

from **Hebrews** and the **gospel** lesson we learned that we are **not** to neglect being in **service** to strangers or showing **hospitality** as well as **not** to neglect doing **good** for others. When you give a luncheon or dinner do **not** just invite those people who can **repay** you—invite the **outsiders**, the ones who are most likely looked **down** upon by society—the <u>poor</u>, the <u>crippled</u>, the <u>lame</u>, and the <u>blind</u>. When we do **that—then** we will be blessed by God because **generally** the ones who are looked **down upon** have **nothing** that this world deems worthy to offer us—they will **not** be able to repay in like manner. Such is the kingdom of God.

The **rewards** for these actions: being humble, having humility, being in loving service and hospitality will be repaid at a **later** time to those who show these behaviors—Jesus says they will be **glorified** at the resurrection. That is when the **real** reward will be given—**not** in this world. How should **we** know what God means us to be like?

The words: humble, humility, service, and hospitality: in most cases, these are words are **not highly prized** and ones that we **rarely** hear in conversation as **great** virtues in our society today. Yet, **that** is the way we Christians are called to live. **He** is the inventor, we are **only** the machine.

<u>But be advised</u>, being **humble** and living your life in **humility** does **not** mean that we are acting as a **doormat** for others to step upon, it does **not** mean letting others **boss** us around, **nor** does it mean that we are to have a feeling

worthlessness about who we are as a child of God. It is <u>very much</u> the **opposite** of that. Its basis is thinking **rightly** about *who we are* in relation to God. It is about knowing our **real** strengths as well as knowing our **true** weaknesses, it is about knowing our **genuine** talents, and it is knowing your **God given** worth in **obedience** to God's plan for your life. To **submit** to His plan is **not** conceit: it is *obedience*."

Being humble and living a life of humility is a balancing act between the opposing and extreme ends of life. It is a balance between being prideful and arrogant when we compare or think ourselves better off in some way or another than another person. The other side of the balance is when we are modest and Unpretentious, when our eyes are focused on God, when we have a right perspective about who we are in relationship with God, and when we realize that it is not about us anyway; but it is about what God has given us in our lives and how His grace is what makes us who and what we are. He is the painter, we are only the picture.

Being in **service and hospitality** toward others brings about **kindness and compassion** when we <u>fix</u> our focus **away** from ourselves onto others. It is **then**when we are **more** aware of the needs and ways we can <u>turn to help</u> meet the **requests** of others. If we wish to be loved we must **first learn** to love and if we

wish to be respected we must **first learn** to respect people. If we wish to be fulfilled in our lives we must **first learn** to share generously with others.

Through the gifts of <u>being humble</u>, <u>acting with humility</u>, <u>and being in service</u>

<u>and hospitality toward others</u> we acknowledge that God <u>created us</u> for **His**purposes and **not** for our own **self** advancement. Through these gifts we acknowledge the **dignity** of <u>all</u> God's people. To **submit** to His plan is **not** conceit: it is *obedience*."

Since I will be gone next Sunday and **Bishop Finck** will be here preaching on our anniversary Sunday, I wanted to talk a minute about **Eden** and our **125**<sup>th</sup> anniversary of service to *Christ and Community* like it says up here in our banner. I believe our readings for this morning are **perfectly timed** as I specifically wanted to point out that **I feel** the words: **humble, humility, service, and hospitality** fit this congregation wonderfully. During the course of Eden's existence **if** these 4 words were **not** at the foundation of who we are as a church I wonder if we would have **continued** to exist—as I am sure there are **many** churches in this area who have **come and gone** since Eden was first established in 1888.

Over the course of these last **125 years** we have had people which God has sent to be a part of this church. People who are **dedicated**. People who **love** this church. People who serve with a **quiet** humbleness. People who worked **tirelessly** to build this sanctuary logging in over **10,000** volunteer hours. There were the

workers as well as those who came to **feed** the volunteers. There are people who **still** volunteer week in and week out around here to keep this the **glorious** house of God and this **community of faith** all that it is. It is **no** mistake that each and every one of you are **here** right now as a part of this congregation. It is **no** mistake that each and every one of you are part of God's plan for this church. And it is no mistake that each and every one of you have the God given talents to continue this church for the generations to come. As C. S. Lewis wrote, "Of course we never wanted, and never asked, to be made into the sort of creatures He (God) is going to make us into. But the question is not what we intended ourselves to be, but what **He** intended us to be when He made us. **He** is the inventor, we are **only** the machine. **He** is the painter, we are **only** the picture." The <u>picture</u> that I see out here today, the picture that God has painted for us is beautiful. It is a tapestry of people made up of those willing to **humble** themselves, to act with **humility**, to **serve** the stranger as well as the neighbor among us, and those who are willing to extend the hand of **hospitality** when needed.

At Eden our **true** success comes through **appreciating** God's people, through developing **loving** relationships with those who come our way, and through working to **improve** God's world.

Through the gifts of being **humble**, acting with **humility**, and being in **service and hospitality** toward others we acknowledge that God **created us** for

His purposes and not for our **own** self advancement. Through these gifts we acknowledge the **dignity of all** God's people **not** only here at Eden but as we go **out** into the world as well. I pray these gifts continue for **generations** to come. All **thanks** be to God. **AMEN**
